The Harp: An Instrument For a Saint (according to Garrison Keillor)

Adrienne Bridgewater brought her Concert Grand Harp to PUUF on Aug. 27 for a program of history, music, and personal stories. She began by playing the most popular song of the 20th Century – Over the *Rainbow* – followed by what is thought the origins of the instrument: Upon returning from their quests, hunters would pluck the string on their of bow and tell their adventures. Eventually another string and then more and more were added to produce musical sounds.



Her own instrument was made in 1976 by a company that produces only 15 harps per year. The column is made of maple and finished in gold leaf, the sound board of spruce. Spruce is a hard wood, as it must be in order to resist the tension of the strings. It has seven pedals which can raise the note of a string by two half steps.


Adrienne replaces each of the 47 strings in her harp every two years. She doesn't want any malfunction to happen while performing at any of the many venues in which she plays. She told some funny (albeit not at the time) stories about weddings where she played the brides' specifically



requested music for walking down the aisle, and the brides wouldn't budge until Adrienne did what she was told *not* to doplay the traditional Bridal March.




Our PUUF Slow Stitch Result

ERAU Open House

PUUF (represented by Jerry Matiatos) and GPUUC (represented by Robert Shegog) were invited to attend an open house on Saturday, August 26 at Embry Riddle Aeronautical University. The open house was for students to become familiar with some of the religious options in Prescott.

In addition to the two UUs, there were Catholics, Baptists, Anglicans, Lutherans, Chi Alpha, LDS, Judaism, and United Church of Christ. It was noted that the only about four to six students went to every table whereas most went directly where they were interested.

The largest group of students stood in line to join Chi Alpha, a Christian Campus organization that was not affiliated with a particular local church, but rather is a national organization with on-campus chapters across the country.

When Jerry chatted with the various organization representatives, he found that a few actually grew in numbers during the pandemic. One Baptist congregation increased by 200 people—they lamented they could no longer have potlucks because they did not have enough space for all 700 congregants.

The Embry Riddle counseling department sponsored this event. One of the department's goals was to have LGBTQ+ welcoming congregations represented and we were encouraged to have our rainbow bookmarks on the table. After the event, we left many of our materials with the counseling department to hand out as appropriate to students. Along with bookmarks, one of the materials left was a coloring sheet which can be used as a tool to calm students. The counselors were very hospitable and appreciated our attendance. They hope we will return next year.

We had a lively and respectful discussion among the 10 or so individuals present. Everyone had a chance to speak. As one could surmise, we had a variety of thoughts on the topic.

They ranged from there is nothing beyond what we see around us, to being agnostic, yet comforted by the idea that there is more beyond the world around us because that means passed on loved ones may still exist in some form, to belief in reincarnation, and belief that there is something undefined beyond the world we perceive that connects all of us together. No one expressed a belief in a God as described in any of the mainstream religions. It was a worthwhile discussion that helped strengthen our beloved community.

PUUF TREATS

Gingerbread Recipe

Dale and Glenna provided treats for our August 27 service. His gingerbread was a big hit and multiple requests for his recipe were made.

1/4 pound butter

1/3 cup brown sugar

1 egg, beaten


2 1/2 cups sifted flour

1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

2 teaspoons ginger

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground cloves



1 cup dark molasses

1 cup real maple syrup

1 cup boiling water

Cream butter and sugar together and add beaten egg. Sift together all dry ingredients. Combine molasses, maple syrup and water. Alternately mix dry and wet ingredients into creamed sugar. Beat after each addition, then beat until smooth. Line a 9 x 9 inch pan with waxed paper OR thoroughly grease sides and bottom of pan. Pour mixture into pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes until toothpick comes out clean. Let cool for at least 5 minutes before turning out. Serve with ice cream, apple sauce, whipped topping or any other favorite. When I serve at home, or when things can be kept warm, I often make and serve with a warm lemon sauce (a soft gravy or dipping sauce type consistency) Have fun and adjust spices to your individual taste.
