The word "potluck" has its origins in "potlatch," and we were fortunate to learn more about this custom while sharing food and friendship.





members of the Board of Trustees and the program committee for their tireless and sometimes tiring work on PUUF's behalf.


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Farmer's Almanac

Speaking of weather, want to know what to expect for this December and 2024? A chance of snow is in the forecast very soon – for Friday, Dec. 2!

The Old Farmer's Almanac for our region states:

Winter will be colder than normal, with the coldest periods in late November, early and late December, and late January. Precipitation will be above normal, as will be snowfall in most areas that normally receive snow, with the snowiest periods in mid- to late January and mid-February. Spring temperatures will be above normal in the west. Precipitation will be above normal. Summer will be hot, with rainfall below normal.




Full Cold Moon arises Dec. 26, which means Santa will have plenty of moonlight to guide his travels by sleigh on Dec. 24.



Also from the Old Farmer's Almanac: December's full moon is most commonly known as the **Cold Moon**—a Mohawk name that conveys the frigid conditions of this time of year when cold weather truly begins to grip us. This full moon has also been called the **Long Night Moon** (Mohican), as it rises during the "longest" nights of the year near the December winter solstice. This name is doubly fitting because December's full moon shines above the horizon for a more extended period than most full moons.



A Celebration of Life for Marriner Cardon took place Nov. 18 at our sister congregation, Granite Peak Unitarian Universalist Congregation, with many friends and family in attendance.

Among those who shared about their connection and respect for Marriner were Dr. Sam Downing regarding Marriner's connection with Northland Cares, and Mary Jo Gregory, president of Northern Arizona Regional Behavioral Health Authority Institute, of which Marriner was a board member. Marriner provided many years of service in the areas of law, finance and innovation with humility, integrity and wisdom.

Marriner also helped create Northland Cares and served on its board for many years. Northland Cares provides health care for communities affected by

Marriner's son Jared spoke about the favorite road trips he took with his father and the lasting impact those trips made on him.

Jerry shared this remembrance during the Celebration of Life:

I (Jerry) learned years ago as an EMT to use humor to temporarily divert the patient's attention away from their issue at hand. I was doing this with Marriner after he had a stroke a couple of years ago. He was not responding laughter—which much with wasn't necessarily unusual for him. So I asked him, "You don't want me to be humorous?" He "You promptly replied, can be humorous...try harder."


Following the Celebration of Life, cookies and ice cream – a daily tradition for Marriner – was enjoyed as people mingled and shared memories.
