

Interludes: End of Life Choices

Despite its inevitability, death is a topic that is not often discussed. End-of-life medical and care options range from doing nothing – i.e., letting nature take its course – to proactive options such as palliative care and/or advanced directives.

One option available to more than 70 million Americans – but NOT in Arizona – is Medical Aid in Dying (MAID). This discussion on end-of-life options includes MAID, and the efforts by Arizona End of Life Options (AZELO) to make MAID an option for Arizonans.

The free presentation takes place from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. Friday, Jan. 12, 2024, at Yavapai College in Building 30A, Room 126. Depending on number of registrants, the location is subject to change.

We were able to provide every one of our guests who were present either one turkey or dinner roast plus a cart full of groceries to round out the meal.

December 3: Rabbi Nina Perlmutter

Rabbi Nina Perlmutter spoke on Polarization: What Might We Do Differently to Move to Better Times? We all may have heard or felt: "I don't trust people on the other side." "My point of view is unwelcome." "I don't feel comfortable talking about it."

This form of bi-modal thinking is fed by anger, fear, and closed-mindedness, which leads to a lack of connection and a resistance to collaboration and compromise.

Rabbi Nina's suggestion is to slow down, reflect on what leads one to not listen to the other side, activate humility (maybe I can learn something from someone I don't agree with), and to have courage to engage one-on-one and promote discussion. Notice the good things in your life 100 times a day, she said. Noticing the good doesn't ignore the bad, she added.
