Remember when PUUF members would gather twice a year for Clean Up Day? Here are four unidentified men - not looking *too* exhausted - that perhaps someone can name.




Does anyone know who the children are depicted in this 1999 Sunday service?

We'll also have painters' tape that won't damage cars when signs are affixed and erasable white markers for writing on windows.

And remember – our efforts will be most effective if we consider our target audience to be the Independent and Undecided voters. So, be positive!



Once our cars are decorated, we'll form a caravan, circle the town, and end up at an official drop box, so we can actually deposit our own ballots that very day.

Starting location will be provided the day before the event to all who have registered. Parade route will be provided when you arrive at the location on the 13th.

Rev. Fritts, by the way, was senior minister of the Cedar Lane Church in Bethesda, Maryland, when he gave a talk on "What Makes Unitarian and Universalism Different from Other Religions?" He was in Prescott in June 1999 to help celebrate his father, Tom Fritts', 80th birthday.

Rabbi Nina Perlmutter's program was titled "Love-Hate Relationship Between Science and Religion." And Marriner was coordinator for a Sunday service.










PUUF Program Recap

Sept 22: Tsuchinshan-Atlas

He said, "Comets are like cats. They both have tails and we never know what they're up to." The Tsuchinshan comet will be closest to the earth on Oct. 12, although "close" is still 43 million miles away.
