Although she left the religion she was raised with at age 17, this PUUF acknowledges that Jehovah's Witnesses, an "activist" religion, taught her skills continues to use well into adulthood. At age 5, she was knocking on doors and passing out leaflets; public speaking came a little later. Just as Jehovah's Witnesses are scientious objectors, this person also protested the Vietnam War.

"It was a good background for somebody who became a peace

activist," she said, adding that she had lots of practice speaking up for herself all through school in order to explain why she didn't say the Pledge of Allegiance (Witnesses' lives are pledged to God, not a country), or celebrate birthdays, or national and religious holidays. Her parents and a younger sister continued with the Witnesses; a younger brother did not.



An anti-nuclear power protest with Alliance for Survival

Activist Marion Pack has been arrested 17 times. The most recent was in March 2017 in Prescott when she and others blocked Gurley Street while protesting against then President Trump and the Republican Party's attempt to overturn the 2010 Affordable Care Act. The Prescott Daily Courier ran a photo of protesters and spoke to Marion, writing this: "(Marion) Pack is part of a statewide progressive community action group called Arizona Indivisible. The organization put out a "red alert" action call on Monday, March 20, to encourage a larger attendance at

this week's Resist Trump Tuesdays demonstrations, such as the one that has been taking place in downtown Prescott near Representative Paul Gosar's office for the past two months.

"This is the first red alert and we expect with Donald Trump being in the White House there will be many more,' Pack said."

Later the judge came down to the jail to talk to the protesters. "He said he'd let us go if we promised not to do it again."

Marion was married at 16 and divorced by 18. Her early marriage – a "teenage mistake" – was a means to get out of the house, and it took her to Germany as her husband was serving in the Army.

Jehovah's Witnesses also do not participate in in government and don't vote, so it wasn't until she was 28 years old that Marion became active in political protests when a nuclear power plant was built seven miles from her home in Ohio. She thought, "I don't like this. Somebody should be doing something about it." So she began with phone calls, meetings, visits to City Hall, and then participating in demonstrations. Because of her and other's efforts, plans for building two reactors were dropped to building just one.

Marion was attending meetings (for a nuclear freeze) at a UU church in Anaheim, Calif., when someone told her, if you want volunteers, ask the Unitarian Universalists. Of the two nearby UU churches, she picked the one that was lay-led. "And that's why I chose PUUF," she said.

Traveling got into her blood early when she shared the front seat on car trips and learned to read maps. Her first trip to India Engagement photo, Marion by herself when her traveling companion baled on


